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Present Perfect Simple Or Present

The present perfect simple is often used in newspaper headlines or TV news programmes to report a recent past event. It is then followed by a series of verbs in the past simple (underlined): Charlton Heston has died aged 84, a spokesman for his family has said. Heston died on Saturday at his home in Beverly Hills.

Present Simple Vs Present Perfect - Real Grammar

The present perfect simple usually focuses on the result of the activity in some way, and the present perfect continuous usually focuses on the activity itself in some way. Ongoing states and actions We often use for, since and how long with the present perfect simple to talk about ongoing states. How long have you known each other?

Sometimes, there is a difference in meaning: 1: The present perfect continuous can be used to emphasise the length of time that has passed. The present perfect simple is generally neutral: They've been waiting for hours! (This emphasises the length of time). They've waited for hours. (This doesn't emphasise the length of time).

Present Perfect Simple or Present Perfect Continuous Tense?

The simple present is used for general statements and actions that take place regularly in the present. The present perfect progressive is used to express the duration of an action that started in the past and continues into the present.

Simple Present or Present Perfect Progressive - English ...

Use. We use Simple Present for general statements about the present and for actions taking place regularly in the present. We use Present Perfect Progressive to express how long an action has been going on.

Remember: We use the past simple for past events or actions which have no connection to the present. We use the present perfect for actions which started in the past and are still happening now OR for finished actions which have a connection to the present.

Present Perfect or Past Simple Tense?

We use the present perfect to talk about time up to now, that is, events that took place in the past but which connect with the present. The present perfect is often used with time expressions which indicate time up to now, for example today, this year, in the last six months: I haven't seen her since January 1995.

Past simple or present perfect? - English Grammar Today ...

Use In British English, the use of Simple Past and Present Perfect is quite strict. As soon as a time expression in the past is given, you have to use Simple Past. If there are no signal words, you must decide if we just talk about an action in the past or if its consequence in the present is important.

Simple Past vs. Present Perfect Simple - English Grammar

We use the present perfect simple (have or has + past participle) to talk about past actions or states which are still connected to the present. Unfinished time and states We often use the present perfect to say what we've done in an unfinished time period, such as today, this week, this year, etc., and with expressions such as so far, until now, before, etc.

Present perfect | Grammar - Intermediate to upper ...

The past simple tense is used to refer to definite time, while the present perfect tense refers to indefinite time.

We use the present perfect with how long, for, since to talk about actions or situations that started in the past and still continue or are still true now. We use the past simple with how long, for, since to talk about actions or situations that started and finished in the past. Compare:

Present perfect or past simple? - Test-English

Both Present Perfect and Past Simple are used to talk about a completed action. The difference is the following: Present Perfect denotes recent actions and events which are connected with the present. Past Simple denotes actions and events in finished time periods (last week, yesterday, at the weekend, etc.).
