John Adams was born in Braintree (now Quincy), Massachusetts, on October 30, 1735, in a small saltbox house now part of Adams National Historical Park. He became the first of his family to go to college when he entered Harvard in 1751.

John Adams witnessed the American Revolution from beginning to end: he assisted James Otis in the Writs of Assistance case in 1761, and he participated in negotiating the peace treaty with Britain in 1783.
